Can our district afford to go solar?

 Solar energy can be procured without a major capital expense by the school district.

Options:

- 1. Solar PPA (Power Purchase Agreement)
 - Solar array on school roof owned by a third party
 - District pays for the solar energy on a monthly basis
 - Long-term agreement (20 years typical)
 - Aggregated purchase through K-Solar Program (NYPA/NYSERDA/SED)
- 2. Financed solar array
 - Owned by the school district
 - Low interest financing by NYPA (10 years typical)
 - Turnkey project management and procurement by NYPA staff



How Does Third Party Ownership Compare to School Owned?

	School Owned	Third Party
Federal Tax Incentives	No	Yes
State Incentives	NYSERDA and SED	NYSERDA
Financing	Bond or NYPA	Debt/Equity
Cost of Capital	Low	Low – Medium
Operation and Maintenance	School District or O&M Provider	Third party
Owner Solar Experience	Varies	Experts
Cost Certainty	Annual production risk	Cost per unit energy produced





Will our school district save money going solar?

- A free solar analysis of your facility will be provided by NYPA
- This will include an analysis of electric bills
- Solar energy is cost competitive with the electric utility prices in many parts of New York State
- Solar energy purchased through a solar PPA provides long-term budgetary certainty





Are the buildings in our district suitable for solar power?

- NYPA providing free site survey and energy analysis through K-Solar
 - Roof age and suitability
 - Ground mounted or parking lot solar options
 - Shading analysis
 - Analysis of electric bills
 - Energy production estimate







How long is the contractual process?

- Allow 3 to 5 months from start to completion of contracts.
- Three contractual options:
 - Join K-Solar aggregated procurement of solar PPAs
 - NYPA/NYSERDA/SED technical and administrative support
 - Economies of scale leads to better pricing
 - Competitive solicitation managed by NYPA
 - 12/31/16 deadline for federal tax credit (drops from 30% to 10%)
 - Finance district-owned solar via NYPA
 - Low interest rates
 - Turnkey project management and procurement option
 - District can finance purchase directly via bond issue
 - NYPA can provide template documents for the district's competitive bid solicitation



How long is the construction process?

- Allow 5 months to one year from project kick-off meeting to operation of solar array.
 - This includes the design, permitting, construction and inspection phases.
- The State Education Department will need to process the building permits for the solar array – even for a third-party owned system.
