Budget Planning Calendar

- January 13, 2021 Present the first draft of the 2021-2022 Budget & Budget for Transportation Department
- January 27, 2021 Present the second draft of the 2021-2022 Budget and Facilities & Operations Budget

• February, 2021

- Continue to review, update and refine the budget
- February 10, 2021 Present the third draft of the 2021-2022 Budget and Preliminary Revenue and Tax Cap Calculation. Tax Levy Limit Calculations must be uploaded to Comptroller's Office by March 1st

Building the Budget

- 2nd Draft Budget to Budget Increase 3.10%
- Primary goal is always to be fiscally responsible
- Budget reflects and supports the Board of Education goals
- Look for ways to reduce expenses without impacting program
- Look for ways to RETHINK, REORGANIZE, and RECONSTRUCT
- Budget Presentations will focus on highlights and big picture
- Information that is still needed as of January 27, 2021:
 - Covid related expenses and operation for the 2021-2022 school year
 - Tax Levy Information
 - State Aid Projections and the potential for state aid cuts
 - BOCES program costs for 2021-2022 (3% estimated for 1st draft)
 - Estimated Enrollment for 2021-2022 school year
 - Staffing

Preliminary Revenue Budget

- The US Bureau of Labor Statistics announced that the CPI-U for 2020 was 1.23%, making the allowable levy growth factor for the 2021-22 property tax levy limit 1.23% (1.0123); the lowest since that used in the 2016-17 tax cap
- New York faces its largest budget crisis in a decade
- Estimated New York State budget deficit is \$15 billion
- Preliminary Tax levy and State Aid will be presented February 10th

2020-2021: \$ 227,424,141.62

2021-2022: \$ 234,709,671.63

Year-to-Year Change: \$7,285,530.01 or 3.10%

Preliminary NY State Executive Budget

- Governor Cuomo said the state built two versions of his budget proposal based on how much support the state receives in additional support
- Scenario one: \$6 billion in additional stimulus. This is the basis for the school aid runs and budget bills. This money would be provided to the state and does not appear on the school aid runs
- Scenario two: \$15 billion in additional stimulus. Under this scenario, there would be no cuts and additional aid to school districts

School Aid Runs

- Differences this year:
- Services aid
- Inclusion of STAR
- COVID-19 Supplemental Stimulus
- Local District Funding Adjustment
- For 254 districts, the supplemental stimulus is greater than the local
- district funding adjustment
- For 419 districts, these two amounts are the same

Some Good News.....

"No funds will be withheld" from school districts, Division of Budget spokesman Freeman Klopott said in the release.

Klopott also highlighted a portion of the 450-page executive budget financial plan released earlier this week, where budget officials indicate they plan to rely on \$0 in "school aid/local district funding adjustment" to close the state's budget deficit and said previously withheld or reduced payments to districts would be refunded by March 31.
