


High School Transcript

- ▶ Rigor in course selection
- ▶ Academic growth over entire high school career
- ▶ Consistency in grades or upward progression
- ▶ Cumulative GPA (Through end of junior year)
- ▶ Weighted grades (AP's and honors courses)
- ▶ Senior year course selection



College Entrance Exams

SAT vs. ACT

SAT Exam (Until March 2024)

- ▶ 3 hours
- ▶ Measures Reading, Writing and Language and Math
- ▶ Composite score ranges from 400-1600.
- ▶ \$60.00 per exam
- ▶ Go to: www.collegeboard.org for more information

ACT Exam

- ▶ 2 hours 55 minutes + 40 minute essay (optional)
- ▶ Measures Reading, English, Science, and Math
- ▶ Composite score ranges from 1-36.
- ▶ \$63.00/\$88.00 w essay
- ▶ Go to: www.actstudent.org for more information

SAT Changes (Beginning March 2024)

What is staying the same?

- ▶ Composite score ranges from 400-1600.
- ▶ Measures Reading, Writing and Language and Math
- ▶ Taken at a controlled facility

What is changing?

- ▶ Fully digital
 - ▶ Personal or school device
- ▶ 2 hours
- ▶ Calculators can be used for entire math section
- ▶ Faster delivery of scores
- ▶ Every test is unique

SAT's & ACT's Continued

- ▶ Students should begin taking SAT or ACT in junior year.
- ▶ Recommend that students take test more than once, as many colleges will “super score” results
- ▶ Test Optional policy – visit www.fairtest.org for participating colleges

PSAT/NMSQT

(Preliminary Scholastic Assessment Test)
(National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test)

- ▶ Test includes Evidence Based Reading and Writing and Math sections
- ▶ Will be digital starting Fall 2023
- ▶ Exam offered once a year in October
- ▶ National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test for 11th graders
- ▶ Test length approx. 2 hours
- ▶ Registration letter mailed home in the fall
- ▶ \$25.00 cost (in 2022) to take PSAT exam

Driver Education Information

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NCAA – College Athletics

- ▶ **Any student who plans to play Division I or II sports in college must register with the NCAA**
- ▶ **Important to communicate with your guidance counselor, as our school must send your HS transcript**
- ▶ **NCAA recalculates your GPA based on required core courses (academic courses)**
- ▶ **Student is responsible to submit official SAT or ACT test scores directly to NCAA**
- ▶ **Visit <http://www.ncaa.org/> for more information**

ONE OPPORTUNITY. LIMITLESS POSSIBILITIES.

If you want to play sports at an NCAA Division I or II school, start by registering for a Certification Account with the NCAA Eligibility Center at eligibilitycenter.org. If you want to play Division III sports or you aren't sure where you want to compete, start by creating a Profile Page at eligibilitycenter.org.

ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS

To play sports at a Division I or II school, you must graduate from high school, complete 16 NCAA-approved core courses, earn a minimum GPA and earn an ACT or SAT score that matches your core-course GPA.

CORE COURSES

Visit eligibilitycenter.org/courselist for a full list of your high school's approved core courses. Complete 16 core courses in the following areas:

DIVISION I

Complete 10 NCAA core courses, including seven in English, math or natural/physical science, before your seventh semester.



DIVISION II



GRADE-POINT AVERAGE

The NCAA Eligibility Center calculates your grade-point average (GPA) based on the grades you earn in NCAA-approved core courses.

- DI requires a minimum 2.3 GPA.
- DII requires a minimum 2.2 GPA.

SLIDING SCALE

Divisions I and II use sliding scales to match test scores and GPAs to determine eligibility. The sliding scale balances your test score with your GPA. If you have a low test score, you need a higher GPA to be eligible. Find more information about sliding scales at ncaa.org/student-athletes/future/test-scores.

TEST SCORES

Take the ACT or SAT as many times as you want before you enroll full time in college, but remember to list the NCAA Eligibility Center (code 9999) as a score recipient whenever you register to take a test. If you take a test more than once, send us all your scores and we will use the best scores from each test section to create your sum score. We accept official scores only from the ACT or SAT, and won't use scores shown on your high school transcript.



HIGH SCHOOL TIMELINE

GRADE 9

Plan

- Start planning now! Take the right courses and earn the best grades you can.
- Ask your counselor for a list of your high school's NCAA core courses to make sure you take the right classes. Or, find your high school's list of NCAA core courses at eligibilitycenter.org/courselist.

GRADE 10

Register

- Register for a Certification Account or Profile Page with the NCAA Eligibility Center at eligibilitycenter.org.
- If you fall behind on courses, don't take shortcuts to catch up. Ask your counselor for help with finding approved courses or programs you can take.

GRADE 11

Study

- Check with your counselor to make sure you are on track to graduate on time.
- Take the ACT or SAT, and make sure we get your scores by using code 9999.
- At the end of the year, ask your counselor to upload your official transcript.

GRADE 12

Graduate

- Take the ACT or SAT again, if necessary, and make sure we get your scores by using code 9999.
- Request your final amateurism certification after April 1.
- After you graduate, ask your counselor to upload your final official transcript with proof of graduation.

Core Courses

This simple formula will help you meet Divisions I and II core-course requirements.

$$4 \times 4 = 16$$

- + 4 English courses (one per year)
- + 4 math courses (one per year)
- + 4 science courses (one per year)
- + 4 social science courses (one per year)
- = 16 NCAA CORE COURSES

Freshman Year Timeline

- ▶ **Individual scheduling appointment – Jan/Feb 2023**
- ▶ **Continue to work hard in your classes (everything counts)**
- ▶ **Select courses that are appropriately challenging for you**
- ▶ **Get involved in activities and/or sports and community service efforts**
- ▶ **Prepare for end of year exams**
- ▶ **Summer 2023 – READ, READ, READ, complete any necessary summer assignments and engage in meaningful activities**

Sophomore Year Timeline

- ▶ Review course catalog online in December
- ▶ Meet with your counselor between Jan-February to plan following year courses
- ▶ Continue to take appropriately challenging classes, study and do well in them
- ▶ Continue to get involved in extracurricular activities and consider running for office when able (leadership roles)
- ▶ Consider getting involved with community service and/or continue these efforts
- ▶ Introduction to Naviance and complete Career Interest Inventory with counselors in spring

Junior Year Timeline

▶ In the Fall....

- ▶ Attend College Fairs
- ▶ Register & Take PSAT
- ▶ Continue to monitor your grades & participate in extra-curricular activities
- ▶ Prepare & Register for SAT/ACT

▶ In the Winter...

- ▶ Take SAT/ACT exams
- ▶ Prepare a challenging schedule for senior year
- ▶ Attend College Information Night
- ▶ Junior College Planning Meeting with your Counselor

▶ In the Spring...

- ▶ Attend NCA/WSCA College Fairs
- ▶ Research and visit college campuses
- ▶ Take SAT/ACT exams
- ▶ Consider who you will request to write your recommendation letters & ask 1-2 teachers for recommendation
- ▶ Review essay prompts on the Common Application

Senior Year Timeline

▶ During the Summer...

- ▶ Register to take SAT/ACT in fall
- ▶ Finalize your college list & be aware of admissions deadlines
- ▶ Complete draft of college essay

▶ In the Fall....

- ▶ Meet with your counselor & Follow up with your teachers who are writing recs.
- ▶ Send your SAT/ACT scores directly to colleges
- ▶ Complete your college essay
- ▶ File for financial aid
- ▶ Submit your applications

▶ In the Winter....

- ▶ Submit mid year grades to colleges

▶ In the Spring...

- ▶ College admissions decisions released
- ▶ By May 1st - deposit required
- ▶ Throughout senior year, remember to research & apply for scholarships and continue to monitor your grades!

Course Scheduling

- ▶ Course catalog online December 13th – important resource
- ▶ 9th, 10 & 11th grade students will input course requests online at home between December 15th - January 3rd
 - ▶ Tutorial was mailed home along with information about the scheduling process
- ▶ After the portal closes, counselors will meet individually with students via zoom to review course requests between January & February
- ▶ Students should take a challenging academic program that is appropriate
- ▶ Ask your teacher and/or counselor for feedback on course levels – AP and honors courses
- ▶ Course requests will be available to view on the parent portal on February 10th
- ▶ Deadline to make any changes to course requests for the 2023-24 school year is February 17, 2023
