





Share an essay on any topic of your choice. It can be one you've already written, one that responds to a different prompt, or one of your own design.



WHERE TO FIND STORIES?

- Share your passion.
- Describe an adversity you've faced and how you overcame it.
- Choose a time when you didn't follow the crowd.
- Focus on a small moment.
- Share about a time you had to make a difficult decision or choice and how you made it.



STORIES TO AVOID



- Politics
- Illicit behavior
- Religion unless it is a significant part of your life
- Sports find a new angle
- World Peace (or other big topics)

HOW PARENTS CAN HELP STUDENTS FIND STORIES

- Brainstorm a list of experiences, accomplishments, and activities. Focus on what these have meant to your child, more so than the actual events.
- What personality traits and values does your child want to convey?
- What message does he/she want to send?
- What is your child passionate about? How have they changed or grown as a result of this passion?

OTHER WAYS PARENTS CAN HELP

- 1. Remember, your child is stressed.
- 2. Be patient. This is a process not a one-time event.
- 3. Make sure your child answers the question and stays within the word limit.
- 4. Provide time management by helping your child prioritize essays and stick to deadlines.
- 5. Proofread the essay for grammatical errors, spelling mistakes, complicated language, and confusing logic.

HOW STUDENTS CAN PREPARE

- Make a list of all the essays you must write, and the requirements and deadlines for each.
- Read the essays that were accepted by the schools to which you are applying.
- Keep a journal or a diary.
- Think about songs, books, smells, and sights you like, what stood out to you about them, and why.
- Answer reflective questions such as:
 - What do I value?
 - How did I make that decision?
 - What does this mean to me?
 - Why is this important to me?
